Community Outreach

Overall charitable giving

- Focus areas: Education, arts, community betterment, and direct services

Financial Literacy program

The UBT Financial Literacy program is designed to serve nonprofit organizations within Lincoln, Nebraska. For many Lincoln residents, there is a need to learn basic money management skills that build a foundation for a better financial life. Currently, these valuable financial skills may not be shared at home, and they haven't always been taught in our schools. There is simply an absence of knowledge when it comes to money, and the Financial Literacy program is here to bridge that gap in our community.

- 31 community workshops hosted
- 14 nonprofit organizations supported
- 352 community members served
- 24 individual coaching sessions





"There was a time in my life where I couldn't find stable work. I was sleeping on the floor, had no money in my bank account, and everything I owned fit in my car. Traditional personal financial education hasn't always been relevant or accessible for community members from low-income backgrounds.

I am seeking to change that.

Financial education is an important part of community wellness. UBT's Financial Literacy program removes barriers by providing free financial literacy workshops within the community. The program empowers youth and adults by teaching real-world skills to take steps forward to financial independence. Through UBT's Financial Literacy program, I am grateful to be able to support community members by providing a pathway to a more equitable financial future."









Magic Moments 20th anniversary

Union Bank celebrated a milestone 20th year of our Magic Moments program in 2022. This program is a great opportunity for us to give back; we invite Lincoln churches, organizations, and community members to submit nominations on behalf of neighbors, friends, or family who deserve recognition or could use some extra love. This year, in honor of our 20th anniversary, we doubled the number of recipients from 10 to 20!

Learn to Dream scholarships

The Learn to Dream Scholarship, established in 2007, is generously funded by the Acklie Charitable Foundation, Nelnet, and Union Bank & Trust, and is a partnership with Southeast Community College. The scholarships give economically disadvantaged students the opportunity to complete up to 60 semester credit hours at one of the Southeast Community College campuses in Beatrice, Lincoln, and Milford without paying tuition and fees. All juniors and seniors who qualify for free or reduced lunch are eligible for the scholarship. UBT provides \$560,000 each year toward Learn to Dream and People of Prosperity scholarships. All told, more than 500 scholarships were awarded throughout 2022 and each year prior.

Office space for TeamMates

In Lincoln, office space for the TeamMates mentoring program is provided by UBT, complementing their home office in Omaha.

VIP (Ventures in Partnership) school program

The VIP program was started by LPS in the 1980s, and Union Bank started participating in the program in 1997. The goal of this program was to pair schools and programs with businesses and organizations to work on mutually beneficial projects. While this program was discontinued by LPS in 2004, UBT continues to have a VIP relationship with Calvert Elementary School, Morley Elementary School, Schoo Middle School, and Lincoln Southwest High School.

- Teacher Appreciation Day luncheon for all staff at three schools
 - Served 70 staff members
- Read Across America at Morley and Calvert
 - All grades K-5, about 25 volunteers at each school
- Teach financial literacy in classes
 - Fourth and fifth grades at Morley and Calvert Schools; one class per grade each semester
- Provide the opportunity for nine students to have lunch with UBT professionals at a UBT location
- Provide opportunities for students to job shadow at UBT's 70th & Pioneers location
 - Five fifth graders from Morley shadowed UBT staff
- Employees purchase and donate items wanted by four families of LPS students during the holiday season
- Assist with Backpack Food Program at Schoo Middle School
 - Once a month during the school year, two employees help facilitate a food distribution site, working with the Food Bank of Lincoln





Environmental Initiatives



Green Team: UBT's Green Team was formed with the mission of implementing and improving "green" initiatives bank-wide. The team's vision is to make UBT a sustainable, environmentally friendly leader in all communities we serve — now and in the future.



Recycling: Recycling services are in use at nearly every UBT location (25 sites total). UBT recycled 20,780 pounds of metal in 2022.



Compost programs: Composting service has been established at five larger UBT offices.



Energy reduction: Fluorescent bulbs were replaced with LED fixtures at four locations per year, cutting energy consumption in those locations by 66%.



Furniture donations: Eight office sets were donated to local nonprofits consisting of desk, chair, guest chairs, and bookcases.

Shred Day: April 2022

Shred Day is an annual community event that offers community members free document shredding services to help them avoid identity theft and fraud, reduce clutter, and help the environment. We partner with Paper Tiger to provide this service. We also partner with a local nonprofit to collect in-kind donations on their behalf. In 2022, we partnered with Community Action Partnership of Lancaster and Saunders Counties to collect 2,600 personal hygiene items.

- 2,400 cars came through
- 52,300 pounds of documents were shredded

Annual trash pickup and recycling day

In April 2022, 118 volunteers on 12 teams of UBT employees fanned out to sites all over the city, picking up litter, trash, and recyclable materials. We hit parks, schools, and other public areas in an effort to make our city just a little more beautiful.

Picking it up:

- Partner: Keep Lincoln & Lancaster County Beautiful (KLLCB)
- Volunteers: 118Number of sites: 7
- Weight of collected trash: 539 pounds
- Weight of recycling: 98 pounds (recycling is less due to guidelines regarding what we were able to recycle)
- Distance covered: 105 miles/57 acres
- We were awarded a grant of \$3,000, which we in turn split between the following:
 - Lincoln Food Fort
 - Southern Heights Food Forest





Employee Volunteer Spotlight: Junior Achievement

"I started volunteering for JA six years ago because I love working with kids. To me, it's something small I can do to have an impact on the future of our community. I started with one class and still volunteer for that same teacher every year. Now, I average about seven classes per school year, ranging from kindergarten to fifth grade. The kids are so excited to learn about how to make good money choices, how goods and services flow throughout the world, and how to become an entrepreneur. The JA materials make it fun for the students to learn, and the kids are so creative with their ideas. It has been fun to expand on their learning. One year with our VIP School Partner, Calvert Elementary, the students took an idea of creating their own business of a lemonade stand to reality. They set up a stand outside of Calvert, and all proceeds went to help flood victims. Getting to know these kids and watching their knowledge and future possibilities grow during our sessions is what makes this experience so rewarding for me."

Whether we're planting trees in city parks or donating lifesaving blood, we're eager to roll up our sleeves and make a difference. It's part of Union Bank's culture — employees of all levels are empowered to be leaders in philanthropy, inspiring others to consider how any contribution of time, talent, or money can change lives.

"One of Omaha's community service events is Project Linus, where we collect donations of materials from employees and make blankets for children in foster care, hospitals, and shelters. These blankets provide a sense of security to children who are seriously ill, traumatized, or otherwise in need. In doing so, it became very close

to my heart, as my best friend had two of her grandsons that needed bone marrow transplants. They would need to be hospitalized for around 40 days. We made blankets that year and donated two of them to the boys so they could have these during their stay in the hospital. They loved seeing the bright colored dinosaur blankets, and they kept these with them through their entire journey."

"Bonham Theatre in Fairbury is such a big piece of history for not only the town, but in people's lives. I grew up just 20 miles away, and the Bonham was the first movie theater I ever experienced, seeing *March of the Penguins* when I was nine years old. The theater closed in 2012 for five years — a big loss for this little town, as there is only so



much to do for local entertainment. The theater reopened in 2017 on a volunteer basis and is a favorite for our branch to support. Brian, the manager, is always so appreciative of our help, and we get to watch a movie on the big screen, so it's truly a win-win for everyone involved. Brian has also given a handful of us a tour of the historic building and educated us on what they are doing to keep its memory alive. I am so glad they were able to reopen their doors and allow us an opportunity to give back locally."

Ukraine: From Poland With Love

"After watching the devastation in Ukraine on the nightly news, I was moved — driven, in fact — to do something to help. And I felt compelled to make an impact beyond opening my checkbook; to physically assist. I think the point is everyone knows this war is wrong on so many levels and I truly felt the need to do something, however small, to help. The Big Give



Our local nonprofits are the lifeblood of this community, and never has that been more evident than over the past couple of years. They've worked hard to keep our community safe and cared for, and we decided it was our turn to give back to the local organizations who give so much to our most vulnerable citizens.

In September 2022, Union Bank gave away \$1 million, split evenly among 10 different nonprofits to fund projects or programs that are serving our community — and we looked to the community to help us determine who should get the funds. Here are the 10 nonprofits the community chose for us to fund:





Uplifting Paws

Uplifting Paws therapy dog program provides the Lincoln community with comfort companions that can alleviate mental health issues caused by traumatic events, health conditions or disorders, or overall anxiety. With their \$100,000 gift, they will be able to add a full-time dog trainer to their staff that will double their impact in the community.

Catholic Social Services

With their \$100,000 gift, Catholic Social Services will be able to provide financial assistance to families to help pay rent utilities and feed the growing number of people requesting food from their CSS Food Market.

Clinic With a Heart

For 20 years, Clinic With a Heart has helped thousands of our neighbors access quality healthcare for free. With their \$100,000 gift, Clinic With a Heart plans to expand their free clinic services by adding a daytime primary care medical clinic, make their current space more accessible to patients, and purchase an Electronic Health Record system to better maintain patient records.





Autism Family Network

The Autism Family Network is a community resource not only for families with autistic children, but also other developmental disabilities, learning disabilities, and physical disabilities. With their \$100,000 gift, AFN will expand their programming and outreach by providing education and training; advocating for support, services, and inclusion; hosting recreational and social activities; and funding special needs and crisis support.

Center for People in Need

The Center for People in Need's Diaper Bank program helps keep more than 800 babies dry and healthy every month — but the diaper need in Lincoln continues to grow. With their \$100,000 gift, the CFPIN will be able to provide diapers and wipes for more low-income families.

Camp Sonshine

Camp Sonshine will use their \$100,000 gift to help build a new recreation facility and climbing wall to continue impacting kids with powerful and positive summer camp experiences. The addition of this gym and climbing wall will provide kids with an indoor space to continue building friendships and connections on days when extreme weather makes it difficult to be outdoors.

I've Got A Name

The statistics on sex trafficking from those working day in and day out to put a stop to it are sobering. With their \$100,000 gift, I've Got A Name's Connect to Protect initiative will provide more resources to fight sex trafficking in Lincoln, and they will host the Connect to Protect Conference, the first in Lincoln to address sex trafficking on a local level.

Capital Humane Society

Capital Humane Society launched its Pawsitive Impact initiative in early 2022 to provide resources for income-qualified individuals to help them afford veterinary care, pet food, and supplies. With their \$100,000 gift, CHS will have the means to offer even more services through this initiative.

Pius X Foundation

With their \$100,000 gift, Pius X Foundation will be building a new secure front entrance and central welcome center for the school, which enhances security and improves the visiting experience for students' families and community members.

The White Cane Foundation

With their \$100,000 gift, The White Cane Foundation will accelerate their goal to provide new clothes to impoverished students in Lincoln by expanding their partnership from seven Title I elementary schools to 12.
